Fresh Drilling Results Point to Significant Maiden Resource at Alice Copper Porphyry Deposit

Extensive exploration drilling and geophysics program to test wider porphyry potential over +6km at Productora copper project

Hot Chili (ASX: HCH) is pleased to announce that strong drilling results have paved the way for a significant maiden Resource estimate at the Alice copper porphyry deposit within the Company's Productora copper project in Chile.

The maiden Alice Resource will form part of an increase in the total Mineral Resource and Ore Reserve estimate for Productora, which will in turn be included in the Productora Pre-feasibility study (PFS) to be released this year.

The establishment of substantial copper porphyry Mineral Resources is important to Productora because it would both increase the overall mine life and raise the possibility of increasing production rate beyond the currently planned rate of 55,000 to 65,000 tonnes of copper a year.

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


Figure 1. Plan displaying the location of the Alice copper porphyry discovery in relation to the planned Productora central pit design, Mineral Resource outlines and TMI.

Drilling at Alice over the past month has confirmed the location and extent of bulk copper porphyry mineralisation within the initial discovery area, located 400m immediately west of the planned central pit development at Productora (Figure 1).

A total of 17 Reverse Circulation (RC) holes for 4,712m and one diamond hole (DD) for 393m (metallurgical hole) have been completed over the past month at Alice.




Figure 2. Cross section displaying the location of new copper drilling intersections at the Alice copper porphyry deposit, Productora copper project.

Recent results include 129m grading 0.6% copper from 188m depth, including 8m grading 1.2% copper and 0.1g/t gold (Figure 2).

Final results from this programme are expected in coming weeks.

ASX Code

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Importantly, Hot Chili is now preparing to commence an extensive exploration campaign over a +6km-long porphyry footprint at Productora. The area to be targeted has been studied intensively since it was discovered late last year in association with Alice.

Exploration drilling is scheduled to start next week. Hot Chili is also planning to commence an Induced Polarisation (IP) and Magnetotelluric (MT) geophysical survey at Productora within a fortnight.

It is anticipated that the IP and MT survey will refine copper porphyry drill targets ahead of further drilling.
